Strange and Known Places is a collaborative curatorial project featuring the work of 10 artists based in or with strong ties to Medicine Hat. The exhibition's title reflects on the familiar geography that ties these artists together (Known Places) and the overarching use of personal mythology or an exploration of lesser-understood aspects of the human experience (Strange Places). The exhibition presents 30 works in a range of materials including textiles, photography, leather work, blown glass, painting, drawing and a music video. The included artworks envelop a wide range of enthusiasms, curiosities and passions, offering audiences a chance to see the world in surprising and affecting new frames. For the exhibition's opening at TREX Space, works by each artist were reproduced as posters that were available for audiences to take home as a token of the exhibit and celebration of local talent.

Being in wild nature away from human habitation is an absolute necessity for me to maintain equilibrium.


Do you collect anything?

Do you collect anything?


Earrings, beads, clothes and dolls.





CURATORS CONTRACTORS

Genevieve Farrell (1988) is an emerging curator from Canada. She completed her M.A. in Cultural Studies and Curatorial Practices at the University of Winnipeg in 2018 and currently works as the Program Manager/Curator for TREX Southeast. Genevieve grew up in five countries due to her parent's work assignments and spent the other half of her life residing in various provinces of Canada, all of which led to her interest in cross-cultural and intergenerational exhibition-making. ABOUT THE AFA TRAVELLING EXHIBITION PROGRAM

The Alberta Foundation for the Arts (AFA) has supported a provincial travelling exhibition program since 1980. The mandate of the AFA Travelling Exhibition Program (TREX) is to provide every Albertan with the opportunity to enjoy visual art exhibitions in their community. Three regional galleries and one arts organization coordinate the program for the AFA:

TREX Northwest: Art Gallery of Grande Prairie, Grande Prairie

TREX Northeast and North Central: Art Gallery of Alberta, Edmonton

TREX Southeast: Esplanade Arts & Heritage Centre, Medicine Hat

Each year, more than 600,000 Albertans enjoy many exhibitions in communities ranging from High Level in the north to Milk River in the south and virtually everywhere in between. The AFA Travelling Exhibition Program also offers educational support material to help educators integrate the visual arts into the school curriculum.

Exhibitions for the TREX program are curated from a variety of sources, including private and public collections. A major part of the program assists in making the AFA's extensive art collection available to Albertans. This growing art collection consists of over 9,000 artworks showcasing the creative talents of more than 2,000 artists. As the only provincial art collection in Alberta, the AFA collection reflects the development of the vibrant visual arts community in the province and has become an important cultural legacy for all Albertans.



The Esplanade Arts & Heritage Centre is where the stories of our great collective culture are told through music and dance, painting and sculpture, plays and concerts, exhibitions and installations, artifacts and art, education programs and private events. The Esplanade opened in celebration of Alberta's centennial in 2005 and ever since, Medicine Hat has welcomed a steady procession of artists and audiences, storytellers and story-lovers from around the region and around the globe. The celebration continues today.
